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INTERNATIONAL DIPLOMACY

- the management of cross-border flows through symbolic interaction
 - flows of people, commodities, rights, etc.
 - borders of sovereign territorial states
 - authorized representation is key
 - also, lots of words and gestures

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

- everything that affects the relations between states
- can be divided into three aspects, or systems:
 - international military system
 - international economic system
 - international socio-cultural system
- each lecture focuses on one system

WAR

- the ultima ratio of the international military system
- fighting a war is expensive...
- ...so is preparing for one or deterring one

WHAT IS WAR?

- often a very political question
 - declaration of war carries legal obligations
 - raises the stakes
 - metaphorical "wars"



WHAT IS WAR?

- theological definition: triumph of the dark side of human nature
- behavioral definition: "1000 battle-deaths"
- operational definition: state-sponsored lethal violence
- "the sport of kings"



For WARRE, consisteth not in Battell onely, or in the act of fighting; but in a tract of time, wherein the Will to contend by Battell is sufficiently known...the nature of War, consisteth not in actuall fighting; but in the known disposition thereto, during all the time there is no assurance to the contrary.

The object of war is not to die for your country but to make the other bastard die for his.

— General George S. Patton, 1970

INTERNATIONAL WAR

- organized lethal
 violence directed across
 a state border
- includes threats to unleash such violence
- public violence: groups and uniforms



STRATEGY

- war is intended to put political pressure on the other side
- most effective applied to decision-makers directly
- usually means fighting through defenses first



WHY IS THERE WAR?

- "human nature"
 - humans aren't always warlike
- "corporate profits"
 - lots of ways to make money
- "lack of accountability"
 - sometimes the people call for war



WHY IS THERE WAR?

- states are war-making machines
 - "claims a monopoly of the legitimate use of physical force"
 - state capacity linked to war-fighting
 - international anarchy



PARTICULAR WARS

- security
- resources
- principles
 - regime-type
 - human rights
 - peacekeeping
- "the national interest"



ATHENIANS AND MELIANS

- Athenians land with overwhelming force
- Melos is no threat
- "the strong do what they can, the weak suffer what they must"
- Melians don't submit, and perish
- Athens loses the war



WILL THERE ALWAYS BE WAR?

- "no war" means "no recourse to threats of violence"
- sovereign territoriality/ anarchy opens the possibility of war
- "just war doctrine" as a way of limiting the frequency of war



OLD WARS AND NEW WARS

- "old" wars:
 - fought by states on both sides
 - clearly defined strategic objectives
 - negotiated settlements based on battlefield fortunes
 - laws of war

- "new" wars:
 - fought by a variety of organizations
 - unclear/impossible victory conditions
 - categorical claims, so no clear way to negotiate anything
 - anything goes

OPTIONS

- end state politics
- prove that war is in no one's interest
- use force reluctantly, as a last resort
